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Educating Digital Leaders for the 21st Century

Tech pioneer Dr Hermann Hauser endorses the MSc in Digital International Affairs: "Living through the Fourth Industrial Revolution, almost every aspect of our daily lives is being transformed. [...]

With a curriculum spanning big data, cybersecurity, artificial intelligence and digital diplomacy, you will be prepared to tackle the challenges of the 21st century." — Dr Hermann Hauser FRS, FREng, KBE

The Diplomatische Akademie Wien – Vienna School of International Studies is honoured to receive a testimonial from Dr Hermann Hauser, one of Europe's most influential technology entrepreneurs and a pioneering figure in the global digital landscape. An Austrianborn innovator who has shaped the Cambridge technology ecosystem for decades, Dr Hauser is best known as the co-founder of Acorn Computers and

ARM — the microchip company whose designs power billions of devices worldwide. As co-founder of Amadeus Capital Partners, he continues to play a decisive role in advancing breakthrough technologies and supporting scientific innovation across Europe.

In his statement on the MSc in Digital International Affairs (DIA), which the DA organises in co-operation with the University of Innsbruck, Dr Hauser highlights the profound societal changes brought about by the Fourth Industrial Revolution and the critical need for professionals who understand the digital forces reshaping international relations. The DIA programme specifically responds to this need by integrating cutting-edge technological expertise with the analytical tools of political science, diplomacy and international law.

Covering fields such as big data, cybersecurity, artificial intelligence, digital diplomacy and cyber-marketing, the DIA curriculum prepares graduates to navigate and shape an increasingly complex global environment. Dr Hauser emphasises that the programme equips stu-



dents "to understand and put to use digital technologies that transform international politics," underscoring its relevance for the next generation of leaders in diplomacy, public policy and the tech sector.

With the guidance of an experienced faculty, the support of a dedicated career service and access to the DA's international alumni network, students of the

DIA programme gain the interdisciplinary skills needed to thrive in a rapidly evolving digital world. Dr Hauser's endorsement reflects the programme's ambition: to educate specialists capable not only of understanding technological change, but of shaping it responsibly and strategically on the global stage.

"A Dream Job at a Defining Moment"

The DA's new director, Ambassador Martin Eichtinger, speaks about his path to the Diplomatische Akademie Wien, the challenges facing diplomacy today, the importance of alumni and mentoring and his vision for strengthening the DA's global reach and academic excellence.



Tell us about how your career pathway led and prepared you to become Director of the DA.

I have had an extraordinarily mixed career; it is quite unusual for diplomats to do so many different things. I joined the Foreign Ministry in 1986 and began with a traineeship in Mexico City. Shortly afterwards, Foreign Minister Alois Mock asked me to serve as his personal secretary, a role I held for four years. I then went to the United States, where for eight years I headed the Aus-

trian Press and Information Service in Washington, D.C.

After returning to Austria, I briefly joined the Federation of Austrian Industries (iv), before being asked by the Federal Chancellor to become Chief of Staff to the Austrian Special Representative for reparations to forced and slave labourers. After one year, I returned to the iv as Head of International Affairs and later completed an internship as a project manager at a factory in eastern Russia.

Subsequently, I was appointed Chief of Staff to the Minister of Economic Affairs and Labour and later served as Secretary General. After five years, I returned to the Foreign Ministry as Ambassador to Romania and the Republic of Moldova. This was followed



by an assignment as Director General for Cultural Policy and Science, and later as Austria's Ambassador to the United Kingdom.

After more than three years in London, I joined the government of Lower Austria as a state minister. I then returned once again to the Foreign Ministry, serving as coordinator for neighbourhood policy in the Danube region, before being appointed Ambassador to Italy, a position I held until 31 July of this year. On 1 August, I became Director of the *Diplomatische Akademie Wien* — a role I had long aspired to.

Having worked in diplomacy, private industry, economic policy, labour-market affairs, health care and politics, I believe I bring a very broad perspective. I wanted to share these experiences with the next generation and contribute to educating future leaders. For me, this is truly a dream job.

How do you plan to continue the legacy of the DA in today's rapidly changing global environment?

The DA has been a prestigious institution for decades, and if one looks back over its 271-year history, it has always been a very special place. Today, it is more relevant than ever. International structures have become increasingly fragile, and future diplomats will face a

very different global landscape.

We have experienced a succession of crises, from the Covid-related financial crisis to a war in Europe, while at the same time witnessing major shifts in the international system. For a country like Austria, preserving an international order based on

rules and international law is essential, including in areas such as trade and the WTO. Small and medium-sized states depend on a just and reliable framework.

At the same time, challenges go far beyond geopolitics. Climate change, the protection of democracies and the impact of artificial intelligence are transforming our societies. Diplomats therefore need an excellent education, not just individual courses but a solid intellectual framework rooted in economics, history and international relations.

History is particularly important, because understanding the present requires understanding the past. Language skills are equally crucial, as international relations are shaped by the human factor. Our aim is to provide students with a strong foundation while encouraging them to think creatively and independently.

What role does the alumni network play for the DA?

The alumni network is extremely important to us. Over decades, and especially since the relaunch of the DA after the Second World War, it has grown into a truly global community of more than 4,000 alumni. Many hold senior positions worldwide, which greatly enhances the reputation of the Vienna School of International Studies.

The network also includes participants from our executive training programmes, not only graduates of full academic degrees. Many alumni tell me they have very fond memories of their time in



Vienna, not only academically but also because the DA is, in many ways, a unique family.

We therefore make a strong effort to stay in touch through club.da newsletters, alumni events and alumni weekends. Our alumni are a precious part of this institution.

As the first Director in a long time who is not an alumnus of the DA, does this give you a different perspective?

While I am not a graduate of the DA, I have been closely connected to the institution for decades. I have taught here, organised numerous events and visited the Academy many times in my diplomatic career. In addition, I am a graduate of Johns Hopkins SAIS and therefore know very well what it means to be a postgraduate student.

Working here naturally provides a deeper insight into structures, budgets, curricula and infrastructure, but I had a good idea of what to expect. I am not a stranger to the DA.

What legacy would you like to leave as Director?

My predecessors have done an outstanding job in preserving and strengthening the DA's reputation under very different circumstances. Student numbers and international recognition have grown significantly.

We are proud of our faculty: more than 120 professors for 243 students, which is an excellent teacher—student ratio. At the same time, there is a clear need to modernise infrastructure and further digitalise processes. This year, for the first time, we

successfully implemented a fully paperless student registration system and installed state-of-the-art interactive blackboards.

Further modernisation is challenging in times of economic recession, but I am constantly working to secure additional funding and sponsorship, including from the Foreign Ministry. We are also responding to students' requests for greater geographical diversity, for example by planning new partnerships in Latin America.

My goal is to expand the DA's global reach, modernise its infrastructure and maintain the highest academic quality.

What advice would you give to recent graduates of the DA?

My most important advice is to find a job you truly love. You will only excel if you are genuinely passionate about what you do. Create an international career that matches your talents and motivation, and find the niche that suits you best.

What has been most gratifying for you so far?

Working with the students. They are curious, engaged and eager to contribute positively to the world, while also fully enjoying student life. This vibrant student body is the true gem of the institution and a constant source of motivation.

What makes a great leader, in your view?

Curiosity, a clear set of values and a willingness to keep learning. Leadership also means teamwork: allowing others to shine and surrounding yourself with excellent people. Humility is essential.

What are your plans for the future of the DA?

We want to remain attractive to outstanding international faculty and further expand our global partnerships. Vienna, with its international organisations and unique location, is a major asset. I am confident that we will continue the DA's long tradition of educating global leaders.

On 1 August 2025, Ambassador Emil Brix passed the baton to the new Director of the Diplomatische Akademie Wien - Vienna School of International Studies, Ambassador Martin Eichtinger. We thank Ambassador Brix for his outstanding leadership over the past eight years and warmly welcome Ambassador Eichtinger to the DA community!

Ambassador Eichtinger, born on 5 April 1961 in Graz, has had a distinguished career in diplomacy, public administration and politics. Having joined the Austrian diplomatic service in 1986, Martin Eichtinger served as personal secretary to Vice Chancellor and Foreign Minister Alois

Mock and in various key roles, including Ambassador to Romania and Moldova (2007-10), the United Kingdom (2015-18) and, most recently, Italy (2024-25) as well as Director General for Cultural Policy (2010-15)

and Austria's Special Representative for Neighbourhood Policy and the Danube Region (2023- 24).

From 2018 to 2023, Martin Eichtinger was a member of the government of Lower Austria, responsible for housing, labour markets and international relations. In addition to his diplomatic and political career, Martin

Eichtinger held key roles in the Federation of Austrian Industries (iv), where he managed international relations. In 2003, Eichtinger joined the Austrian Ministry of Economics and Labour, serving as Chief of Staff and later as Secretary General.

Ambassador Eichtinger is married and has two children.

Alumni Supporting the Next Generation

The DA has long benefited from the strong commitment of its alumni to supporting current students.

Through financial assistance, mentoring and career-oriented initiatives, DA alumni continue to play a vital role in fostering opportunity, inclusion and professional development for future generations of international professionals.

The central pillar of this engagement is the DA's Alumni Association, **club.da**, which channels alumni support into a range of targeted activities. This demonstrates how alumni engagement can translate into strong and meaningful support for students at critical stages of their academic and professional journeys.

club.da Scholarships: Fifteen Years of Impact

In early December, the **club.da** Scholarships were awarded for the 15th time, marking another milestone in a programme that has become a cornerstone of alumni support at the DA. This year, scholarships were awarded to students from Ghana, Kosovo, Palestine and Syria. In addition, two ad hoc scholarships were granted to students from the United Kingdom and the Netherlands this summer already.

Since the 2011–12 academic year, **club.da** has awarded a total of EUR 127,000 in scholarships to 60 students from 31 countries. Notably, two thirds of all recipients have been women, underlining the programme's contribution to promoting gender balance and equal access to education in the field of international relations.

Portraits of this year's scholarship holders will be featured in the next issue of **club.da** alumni news.

For the first time, **club.da** also sponsored a student's participation in the European Forum Alpbach 2025, enabling engagement with one of Europe's most prominent platforms for interdisciplinary and international exchange. Lew Töpfer on their experience at EFA:



"The European Forum Alpbach was a once in a lifetime experience. Getting to discuss the future of Europe with brilliant young people from all over the world in the middle of the Austrian mountains not only gave me the opportunity to delve into new topics, like ocean governance to military training, but also to reflect on my responsibility and vision for the world and to discuss these ideas with a plethora of decision-makers.


A very special aspect of Alpbach are the Fireside Chats. I was very lucky to moderate two of these: one with Peter Thompson, the UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy for the Ocean, and one with Melissa Fleming, Head of the UN Department of Global Communications. These conversations were incredibly insightful and a great opportunity to ask not only about the issues the world faces, but their personal journey within the United Nations.

Another highlight was getting to participate in the international evening, where I performed a Kashubian song. Getting to showcase my indigenous background on such a large stage was very special. Lastly, the IG Vienna Group made the Alpbach Forum that much more special - organizing a Pride and a Climate Protest, hosting workshops, discussing the democratic discourse and getting to experience Alpbach together which such a diverse, engaged and forward-looking cohort was simply amazing!"

RCVMT: Scholarships and Mentoring

The Rotary Club Vienna Maria Theresia continues its engagement at and for the DA as well. In the 2025–26 academic year, the Rotary Club will award a scholarship in the



Beyond financial assistance, RCVMT has played a key role in developing structured mentoring opportunities for DA students. Since the 2021–22 academic year, the RCVMT Mentoring Programme has connected students with experienced professionals willing to share insights, advice and career guidance. As of 2024–25, this initiative has become a joint programme of RCVMT and club.da, broadening its reach and strengthening alumni involvement.

Within this framework, DA alumni and RCVMT members act as mentors to interested students, offering individual support tailored to diverse career paths in diplomacy, international organisations, public service, NGOs and the private sector. With a record-setting 28 mentor-mentee pairs, the programme has reached a new peak. We thank all participants for their time and dedication as well as all volunteers who were ultimately not selected as mentors for their willingness to share their knowledge and experience.



Career Support Through da.link

Alumni engagement also extends into structured career services. The da.link career services, initiated and continuously supported by club.da, remain a key resource for DA students navigating the transition from academic study to professional life.

A highlight of this support is the

annual da.link career day, held each March. On this occasion, HR experts from about 20 international organisations, NGOs, public authorities and private-sector companies make themselves available for an afternoon of 10-minute one-to-one conversations with DA students. These short but focused exchanges offer valuable insights into recruitment processes, required skill sets and career entry points across a wide range of sectors.

A Collective Effort

None of these initiatives would be possible without the dedication and generosity of the DA alumni community. **club.da** extends its sincere thanks to all active alumni – and in particular to its members – whose regular contributions and additional donations make scholarships, mentoring programmes and career services a reality.

Through their continued engagement, DA alumni not only give back to their alma mater but also help shape an inclusive, supportive and forward-looking environment for today's students and tomorrow's leaders.








DA Alumni in Numbers: Growth, Diversity & Change

More than 3,000 alumni worldwide, rising gender balance, increasing diversity of academic backgrounds and a growing MAIS programme: the latest alumni statistics offer a snapshot of how the community of the Diplomatische Akademie Wien continues to evolve.


With the most recent graduation in June 2025, the alumni community of the *Diplomatische Akademie Wien* continues to grow steadily and to reflect the Academy's increasing diversity and international reach. According to our latest alumni statistics, the DA now counts **3,051 alumni** across its academic programmes DLG (since 1965), MAIS (since 1997), MSc ETIA (since 2007), PhD IIS (since 2014) as well as the former Special Programme in International Studies (SPIS, 2000-07).



Gender Balance: Closing the Gap

One of the most notable long-term developments is the evolution of gender distribution. Overall, the alumni community is now close to parity, with 48.8% female and 51.2% male alumni. This balance reflects a clear trend over time: while earlier cohorts were predominantly male, more recent programmes show a significantly higher proportion of women. In particular, the

Master of Advanced International Studies (MAIS) and the MSc in Environmental Technology & International Affairs (ETIA) both display a clear female majority, underlining the DA's role in promoting gender balance in international careers.



Academic Backgrounds: Hallmark Interdisciplinarity

The diversity of academic backgrounds remains a defining feature of DA alumni. Prior studies in political science and international relations form the largest group, followed closely by economics and law, while languages and history also continue to play an important role. At the same time, graduates with backgrounds in technical and natural sciences have become more visible, particularly through interdisciplinary

more visible, particularly through interdisciplinary programmes such as ETIA (see chart above).

A special shift can be seen since the DA's becoming an independent institution in 1996. Previously, most students held a background in law; since then, the academic profile has diversified significantly.

This mix highlights the DA's long-standing emphasis on interdisciplinarity as a foundation for international professional life.

Global Footprint: International by Design


Geographically, the alumni community remains strongly European, with around 85% of alumni originating from Europe, including a substantial share from Austria. At the same time, the DA's global reach is evident: alumni represent more than 130 nationalities, with significant numbers from North America, Asia, Africa and Latin America. This international composition not only enriches the student experience in Vienna but also contributes to a truly global alumni network extending across all regions of the world.

club.da: "Your Home After Graduation"

A particularly strong indicator of alumni engagement is membership in **club.da**, the DA's alumni association. Currently, almost 60% of all alumni are active **club.da** members, underscoring the association's role as "Your home after graduation". Membership rates are especially high among graduates of the MAIS programme, reflecting both the growth of this programme and the strong identification of its alumni with the DA community.

Programme Trends: MAIS on Track to Become the Largest Programme

Looking ahead, programme development within the alumni body points to a significant shift. While the Diploma Programme (DLG) remains the historically largest programme, the MAIS has been growing steadily over the past years. Based on current trends, MAIS is expected to overtake the DLG within the next two years as the largest programme at the DA. This development mirrors broader changes in postgraduate education and confirms the strategic importance of MAIS within the Academy's academic portfolio.

► Robert Schuett wins Fulbright-Botstiber Visiting Professor Award

Our warmest congratulations to DA Professor Dr Robert Schuett who has received the 2025– 26 Fulbright-Botstiber Visiting Professor of Austrian-American Studies Award to con-

duct research at Stanford University.

Dr Schuett teaches Geopolitics and Transatlantic Relations at the Diplomatische Akademie Wien - Vienna School of International Studies and has been for many years an Honorary Fellow at Durham University, where he graduated with an M.A. and Ph.D. in politics and international relations. A former civil servant, he also serves as Chairman of the Austrian Political Science Association (ÖGPW).

His research explores the intersection of political theory, international security and diplomacy, with a particular focus on the intellectual legacy of Austrian-American legal and political theorist Hans Kelsen. His major monograph, Hans Kelsen's Political Realism, published by Edinburgh University Press in 2021, has recently been translated into Spanish.

Dr Schuett will spend his Fulbright Scholar time at Stanford University's Center for International Security and Cooperation (CISAC), conducting research on Hans Kelsen, international security and intelligence theorization. His project seeks to bridge theoretical inquiry with practical relevance, fostering dialogue between European and American traditions of thought.

"My intellectual biography is intimately intertwined with the United States," said Dr Schuett. "To become a Fulbright Scholar and spend time in the U.S. at such a crucial moment fills me with pride and joy."
